Forest Kindergarten

The long-term plan for the Forest Kindergartens is for two containers to be put on some hard-standing between the North carpark and Cammo Road. Once this happens, the two Forest Kindergarten groups will be based there. This will bring an end to the unsatisfactory current arrangements whereby the bus is parked for long periods at the Lodge and the food delivery van has to drive up and down the driveway to the main house ruin. At this point we do not know when the containers will arrive and of course the kindergarten has been suspended currently.

Environmental Report



Dead wood

Given that the park has turned into a bit of a quagmire over the winter months, we are lucky to have piles of woodchip being brought in by Special Branch. This has enabled us to cover over the worst affected pinch points in the park. It may be worth pointing out that we cannot use the woodchip on areas that will grow grass back in the summer, because if we do it will prevent the grass growing and consign these areas to permanent mud. Apart from helping park users by making desire line paths less muddy, the wood chip also prevents compaction of the ground which would otherwise result in damage to trees.

We still have quite a lot of woodchip left in the park but as soon as we can get enough volunteers this will be used to mulch trees and protect more of the paths. We will continue to import deadwood into the woodlands both in order to replace natural deadwood that gets burned by park visitors and also to close down some of the desire line paths

which tend to multiply rapidly as some of the paths become muddy and people create more.

As part of the work on the paths, on March 1st the Dirty Weekenders, volunteers from Edinburgh University, turned out to barrow and spread woodchip in muddy places in the park.

the sale of the old farmhouse. This has consisted of **path works, fencing** around the perimeter of the estate, **some repairs to external walls** and the creation of the **North carpark.** The second phase of spending will hopefully include the wetland and boardwalk project as well as, perhaps, consolidation of the walled garden perimeter walls.



Other Activities

Tree Planting

There was a large-scale hedgerow planting carried out on 26 January in South Field. This was highly successful with 36 volunteers planting 155 trees and shrubs. These were planted in green mesh enclosures and are thriving. In addition we have planted hawthorn, hazel, crab apple etc. around the new North carpark so that over time, these will screen the carpark from view.







Birdboxes

Various birdboxes were put up over the winter by the Friends and the Council. These include barn owl boxes, kestrel boxes, starling boxes and

tawny owl boxes.





Bees

Rachael Doughty continues to lead the Bee Group. She reports that the bee colony is thriving so if we have any kind of decent summer, the tantalising possibility of Cammo Honey is there for the Autumn.

Barnton Horse Chestnuts

After several requests, the Forestry and Natural Heritage service of the council have responded to Nick's request and replaced the felled/dead horse chestnut trees which stood majestically outside the Bank of Scotland on Whitehouse Road at Barnton. They have planted another horse chestnut and a plane tree. We can all look out for them and make sure they are not thirsty come the summer.

There have been one or two unfortunate incidents with dogs upsetting people in the park in the last few months. We would like to remind everyone that dog owners or walkers are responsible for making sure their dogs do not hurt or intimidate other park users.

Interpretation

Some finger posts to help visitors navigate Cammo Park are ready to be installed when Council workers are available. Interpretation panels for the hedgerow and for Cammo House, along with coloured way markers for the self-guided walks are being prepared and should follow soon after. Simon Gillam of the Friends and Peter Scott of the Community Council worked with the Council to compile an interpretation strategy and to develop proposals, some of which will be taken forward in a second phase.
